

THE EVOLUTION OF GOLF Part 4 ... T. Woods.

In previous issues the origin of golf as recorded by old historians, course played on, the formation of equipment then used, has been covered in general terms, however the one area not yet discussed is the "ball" - the manufacture od same and the progression from the earlier stages to the modern era and that subject is the theme for this edition of our own Penfield Pulse.

Úp until the 17th Century the balls used were wooden ones and generally made from English boxwood however in 1618 (a generally accepted date) the feathery made its appearance. This was a ball of stitched leather tightly stuffed with feathers and was a smaller edition of the ball then used for tennis.. The feather's advent lasted for more than 200 years and involved a period of fine craftmanship.. The leather of untanned bull hide was cut into a single strip for the centre together with a round piece for each side, the edges were then tightly stitched together except for a small section of the seam which was used by the maker to turn the leather inside out. Feathers were then stuffed into it until the leather could hold no more. In the final stage of the stuffing he then pressed the feathers against an iron spike fitted in a wooden frame to obtain maximum compression. Lastly he carried out the delicate operation of stitching up the opening without leaving a protruding seam.

The feathery which was about the size of today's ball is said to have travelled well but among its disadvantages was the fact that during wet weather it became water logged and was like a lead balloon, another disadvantage was that if the ball was topped and the leather damaged the feathers would break out into a great cloud, but despite this some recorded feats testify to the feathery's In 1798 two Edinburgh golfers efficiency. (Scaeles and Smellie) drove a feather ball over 160 foot spire of the St Giles cathedral, not long after this an Edinburgh lawyer drove the ball over the 154 foot high Melville monument in Edinburgh's St Andrew Square. In the distance field some remarkable figures have been recorded. In 1858 a Frenchman (Samuel Messioux) (a forebear of Masso??) drove a ball some 361 yards at St Andrews, it was a slightly frosty morning with a gentle following breeze. !00 years prior to this a Glasgow club golfer (John Gibson) made a series of measured drives with a feathery ranking in

distance from 182 to 222 yards and with those sort of attainable figures it was with a great deal of reluctance the average golfer of the day took some time to adapt to the use of the "gutta percha" which first made its appearance in 1848. An interesting feature relating to the feathery is that no historian made any mention of its putting attributes.

No one is certain who first invented the gutta percha ball but the theory has been put forward that the inventor could have been a member of W T HENLEYS TELEGRAPH WORKS CO who at that time were the experts in the handling of gutta percha. The ball was solid gutta percha with a smooth surface, it carried well in the air and ran well when it struck hard ground. The ball was cheaper to make than the feathery and because of its virtual indestructibility added a great boost to the number of playing golfers. With the continued use of the new ball players found that as the cover wore it travelled further and then became the norm for players to deliberately hand hammer them and they continued to do this until the 1880's when the manufacturers introduced moulds to pit the ball's surface.

The gutta percha ball was not an easy ball to handle and although the longest recorded drive was made by a LT Fred Tait of St Andrew's of some 341 yards and 9 inches in 1893, it was achieved on frozen ground which presumably gave it the longest distance recorded. In general the average golfer was hitting drives within the 150 to 170 yard range and in addition to this because of the solidity of the ball any shot not hit truly caused some severe jarring to the arms.

The rubber cored ball was next on the horizon and was the brain child of an American, Coburn Haskell of Cleveland Ohio, who with the cooperation of the Goodrich Tyre Co. produced the rubber cored ball which went into production in 1901. In the autumn of that year an American golfer, Walter Travis, used it to win the US Amateur Championship. In the following year a St Andrew's golfer, Sandy Herd, using the Haskell ball won the British Open at Hoylake with a four round total of 307 one stroke clear of Harry Vardon who used a gutta percha ball.

From then on manufacturers produced a variety of balls, thinner covers, greater velocity, carry and stability in flight, but the size and weight of the balls remained a variant until the R&A and the USGA came to an arrangement whereby the size and weight should be standardised.

In 1920 the R&A resolved that the weight of the ball should not be greater than 1.62 ounces and the size not greater than 1.62 inches in diameter. The USGA did not immediately agree with this and adopted what they termed an easier pleasanter ball for the average golfer to use (no size given). Since that time several other variations to the ball size, etc, have been introduced but it is not until recent times that it has been agreed that all organisations taking part in international events should all use a standard type ball.

Next issue a few oddities of the game and the progression of golf in Australia. QED


