Competition Changes

September Monthly Medal

With the end of week rain and late change to the Monthly Medal competition on 5th September, which also included the President's Trophy and is already shortened to 1 round, a change in the program will be necessary to fit these competitions in. As such alterations will be made as follows:

26th **September:** Stroke, Monthly Medal, Presidents Trophy

10th October: Stableford, 2nd Round Spring Cup 17th October: Stableford, 3rd Round Spring Cup

These changes will be altered on the online booking system and as always your best source of information on the competition is via the program available on the club website, as this document is always up to date.

<u>Competition changes – Fees and payouts – Effective from 24th October 2015</u>

The committee has decided to make some alterations to the regular Thursday, Saturday and Weekly competitions, as the payouts and fees have not been reviewed or altered for a number of years. The increase in field sizes over this time has resulted in a drop off on the payout amounts as a percentage of the field, as well as an often large number of ball winners.

To try and ensure a fairer return from competition fees to players, increase the value and number of vouchers provided, decrease the number of ball winners and ensure sufficient funds are retained to cover trophies the following changes will be made, effective from 24th October 2015:

The base competition fee will be increased to \$6 for ALL competitions.

There will be between 3 and 5 vouchers awarded per grade, depending on field size (4 based on our average field size).

The top voucher prize will be between \$20 & \$35, depending on field size (\$30 based on our average field size).

The NTP prizes will increase to \$15.

Voucher values will also change to altering in even \$5 denominations, but as we still have a number of the old \$22, \$17 and \$12 vouchers the grade prizes / NTPs will be at these reduced levels until they are exhausted. Over this time grade sizes and handicap

ranges will also be reviewed to try and ensure as even a number of players in each grade as possible.

Competition Vouchers

Unfortunately due to Adelaide Shores no longer renewing their sponsorship with us, competition vouchers won at the club will no longer be able to be used at Adelaide Shores Golf Shop. Whilst this means that competition vouchers will only be able to be spent at the club there are still many items available, from balls, tees and gloves to hats, beanies and a wide range of apparel, with or without club logo, just enquire at the bar. In the meantime the committee will be investigating other areas and ways in which members will be able to utilise their vouchers.

Online Booking System

With the finer weather starting to make an appearance, the match committee will again commence monitoring the online booking system to ensure members are following the rules. A couple of key reminders:

- 1. Members who are not playing must remove their booking ASAP. With times, particularly early in the morning, being highly sought after please show some respect towards other members by allowing them to utilise these times.
- 2. Members should only be making bookings for other members who they know will be playing. Members should not be adding other names into the booking sheet to ensure a four is made.
- 3. When making bookings for other members and guests please ensure that all details are correctly filled out. This will be checked periodically and bookings with no names will be removed.
- 4. If adding a booking of less than four please aim to fill in any other gaps in the sheet, rather than using an empty grouping. The match committee reserves the right to alter member's bookings by +/- 2 groups to clear space and combine bookings into groups of four.

The 2015 BRITISH OPEN

The course where this year's open was held has been variously described by golfing dignitaries thus:

- Sam Snead until you play it, it looks like the sort of real estate that you couldn't give away
- Bob Gardiner (captain of the 1926 US Walker Cup team) – after one round I thought it was the worst course I had ever known.
- Alistair Tait (senior European correspondent for Golfweek magazine) for those used to looking at perfectly manicured, green grass then this utilitarian looking links course does not always suit the eye.
- Bob Gardiner again after playing there on several occasions I decided that it was the most wonderful golf course in the world.
- Bobby Jones (winner of the 1930 British Amateur Championship and architect of the

Augusta National course) – if ever I had been set down and told that I was to play nowhere else for the rest of my life, I would have chosen it. It is the most fascinating golf course I have ever played. There is a way to play it, but this is not always the obvious way, and in trying to find it there is more to be learned than in playing a hundred ordinary American golf courses.

- Tony Lema, 1964 Open Champion – going back there is like visiting an old grandmother. She's crotchety and eccentric, but also elegant. Anyone who doesn't fall in love with her has no imagination.

They are of course referring to the home of golf, and arguably the most famous golfing venue in the world - the Old Course at St. Andrews, where the Open was contested this year and where it is held every five years.


So what is it then that makes it so different, unique, intriguing and, in some ways incongruous, for such a famous course?

It is probably because it still contains many of the features of a course built around 150 years ago e.g.

- The fairways follow the contours of the natural topography of the site and in places are extremely lumpy, thus creating serious uphill/downhill lies.
- Many greens are just extensions of the fairways and follow the same surface contours.
- The deep rough consists of the indigenous vegetation of the area e.g. gorse, tussocks, blackberries, sedges, etc and is completely unmanaged.
- It largely consists of several parallel holes, out and back, in which some fairways are shared by players going in opposite directions.

Some particular examples of its quirkiness as a layout, relative to what would now be considered a more conventional golf course, probably also stemming from its early origins, are the :-

- shared fairway for the 1st and 18th which is about 80m wide.
- six double greens, each up to about 60m long, with a flag at each end.
- need for the second shot onto the double green by players on the 7th to cut across the tee shot of those playing the par-3 eleventh.
- design of the infamous Road hole (No. 17, Index 1, 495 yard, par 4) thus



For this hole to be appreciated you must realise that

- if a drive is to finish on the fairway it must pass over the building
- the road is still in-bounds and a ball must be played from where it lies
- the edge of the green is less than 3 metres from the road and slopes towards it

This year's competition turned into something of a saga due to the inclement weather.

It rained so much on the night after the first round that the second day hit-offs were delayed until all the surface water had drained, or was brushed, away.

Then on the following day play was suspended for a period, shortly after the first groups had hit-off, due to wind gusts blowing balls, that had come to rest on the greens, downwind.

These delays meant that the final round had to be played on the Monday instead of the scheduled Sunday.

Of the Aussies

Mark Leishman – made the three man play-off but virtually eliminated himself from winning with a bogey on the first of the four play-off holes.

Jason Day – missed being in the play-off by leaving his achievable birdie putt short on the 72nd hole.

Adam Scott – was in contention until he 3-putted the 69th from not too far away, and then hitting his drive out-of-bounds on the 72nd.

In summary, for anyone who has any interest in the history and traditions of the game, a visit to St. Andrews, even when not hosting a tournament, would be a most rewarding and memorable experience – I could not recommend it more highly.

We had half the kids doing long shots with Mike and the other half doing putting with me, then we swapped over half way through. There were quite a few beginners so the kids clubs we had came in handy. We were one right hand putter short in the second group, but the lad had a good go with the left hand putter and sunk a 3m putt much to his dad's amazement (and mine - the ball did a small jump first because he hit it with the back of the club!). The little 3 yo (not mine) had a nice time just holding onto his club like a security blanket - mine would have been swinging the thing like a light saber which is why he got left with my sister.

GOLF RULE CHANGES FOR SENIOR GOLFERS

(Seniors being classified as 65 years of age or older) **Rule 1.a.5**

A ball sliced or hooked into the rough shall be lifted and placed on the fairway at a point equal to the distance it carried or rolled into the rough with no penalty. The senior should not be penalized for tall grass which ground keepers failed to mow.

Rule 2.d.6.(B)

A ball hitting a tree shall be deemed not to have hit the tree. This is simply bad luck and luck has no place in a scientific game. The senior player must estimate the distance the ball would have travelled it if had not hit the tree and play the ball from there

Rule 3.B.e (G)

There shall be no such thing as a lost ball. The missing ball is on or near the course and will eventually be found and pocketed by someone else, making it a stolen ball. The player is not to compound the felony by charging himself or herself with a penalty.

Rule 4.c.7. (H)

If a putt passes over a hole without dropping, it is deemed to have dropped. The Law of Gravity supersedes the Rules of Golf.

Rule 5

Putts that stop close enough to the cup that they could be blown in may be blown in. This does not apply to balls more than three inches from the hole. No one wants to make a travesty of the game.

Rule 6.a.9. (K)

There is no penalty for so-called "out of bounds". If penny-pinching golf course owners bought sufficient land, this would not occur. The senior golfer deserves an apology, not a penalty.

Rule 7.G.15 (Z)

There is no penalty for a ball in a water hazard, as Gold balls should float.

Senior golfers should not be penalized for manufacturers' shortcomings.

Rule 8.k.9. (S)

Advertisements claim that golf scores can be improved by purchasing new golf equipment. Since this is financially impractical for many senior golfers, one-half stroke per hole may be subtracted for using old equipment.

Please advise all your senior friends of these important rule changes. And they are written big enough that most of you should be able to read them!
